Gardens at the PepsiCo World
Headquarters in Purchase, New York. We

wandered on the paths that meander thru approximately 168 acres of carefully tended landscape.

Every turn was a new vista with green manicured grass, trees, ponds and fountains. There were perennial gardens surrounded by topiary-trimmed hedges and a walk-thru area of varieties of tall grasses. We stopped to relax in the shade of a gazebo overlooking the water lily ponds complete with a large frog sculpture.

The sculpture collection includes works from major modern sculptors including Auguste Rodin, Henry Moore, Alexander Calder and Alberto Giacometti. Calder sited his red sculpture, "Hats Off" where he wanted it in the park. In the distance you can see David Wynne's "Grizzly Bear" overlooking the water lagoon. It was a very warm sunny day, but the cooling breezes welcomed us as we shared a picnic lunch at tables in the shade, that looked like they were awaiting our arrival. The Causes of the First World
War



Tuesday, June 12th, 7 to 8:30 pm

World War I was arguably the most important event in human history in the last 97 years with machine guns, submarines, airplanes, poison gas,

motorized transport, the tank and flamethrower all having been introduced in modern warfare. Mark Albertson is an historical research editor at Army Aviation magazine and has been a member of the US Naval Institute for more than 25 years. His talk will begin with the French Revolution, which turned loose a litany of movements that would work through the 19th century to undermine the regal system of Europe: Liberalism, Democracy, Republicanism, Secularism, Socialism, Nationalism, the rise of the middle class and also the rich, who came to replace the nobility, and the snowballing of the Industrial Revolution. 

"Great Recipes" Sweet Potato Casserole

6 medium sweet potatoes tender cooked, peeled and cut up
½ cup butter
1 can 5.3 oz. evaporated milk
1 orange zest
¼ C sherry
½ C brown sugar
2 egg whites
1 C chopped pecans
3 T melted butter

Mash potatoes in mixing bowl at medium speed and add butter, milk, orange zest, sherry & brown sugar. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into potato mixture. Pour into

buttered casserole dish and sprinkle with chopped pecans and melted butter. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes. Enjoy with ham or pork chops, salad and dessert.
